## COOPERATION

### 4<sup>th</sup> MEA REN Workshop and Regional Seminar on Combating Environmental Crime held in China

The UNEP Division of Technology, Industry and Economics (DTIE) OzonAction Programme and the World Customs Organization Regional Intelligence Liaison Office for Asia and the Pacific (WCO RILO A/P) organized the 4<sup>th</sup> MEA-REN workshop in Beijing, China from 21 to 22 September 2010 in cooperation with Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) and the China Customs.



The MEA-REN workshop brought together 123 experts from 28 countries and 18 international agencies to strengthen the cooperation at both national and regional levels in order to improve implementation of the relevant MEAs and to gain better control over trans-boundary movement ozone depleting substances (ODS), persistent organic pollutants (POPs), and hazardous waste by promoting further international co-operation.

In the opening, Swedish government expressed that support to this MEA-REN network is in line with Swedish priorities both in relation to its important theme but also in relation to the capacity building approach.

The meeting discussed the lessons learnt from Project Sky Hole Patching, and INECE (International Network for Environmental Compliance and Enforcement) Inspection Month on Waste. Secretariats of the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm Conventions reported on recent effort to create synergy among the three MEAs and cooperation with Asia and Pacific region. The Basel Action Network presented their findings of civil enforcement and appealed for further cooperation on combating waste trafficking from developed countries to developing countries. Pesticide Action Network presented intelligence collection on harmful chemicals. The Strategic Approach to International Chemicals Management (SAICM), UNEP, WCO, the European Union Network for the Implementation and Enforcement of Environmental Law (IMPEL), United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), presented issues on environmental enforcement, Asia and Europe cooperation, sound chemical management, border enforcement, and public-private partnership on enforcement. Participants discussed the findings from desk study on hazardous waste and harmful chemicals and agreed to further exchange related information to identify problematic trade. Status of the informal Prior Informed Consent System (iPIC) was highlighted and the way forward was explored. Breakout sessions were arranged to discuss the future operation of MEA-REN, implementation of PATROL (Partnership Against Transnational-crime Through Regional Organized Law-enforcement), data collection and reporting on hazardous waste and harmful chemicals, and how to facilitate legal trade in environmentally sensitive commodities.

The two day workshop was held back to back with a Regional Seminar for Customs Officer on Combating Environmental Crime which was held on the 19th and 20th September 2010. The seminar aimed at improving the capacity of customs officers in combating environmental crimes and enhancing regional enforcement cooperation. The discussions covered trend analysis of illegal trade in ODS, hazardous waste, harmful chemicals and wildlife, as well as the analysis of intelligence and identification of environmentally sensitive commodities. Secretariats of CITES, Basel, Rotterdam, Stockholm Conventions and their regional centers, IMPEL and Environmental Investigation Agency exchanged their views with customs officers. RILO for East and Southern Africa Region and Nigeria Customs have also shared their experience with the participants.

## Progress of informal Prior Informed (iPIC)

Year 2010 ended successfully for iPIC. Some 71 countries took part in the mechanism, significantly increasing the number of queries exchanged 38 in 2009 to 111 in 2010.

Less on trade concerning CFC and halons and more on HCFCs cases were found among communications exchanged by iPIC countries. There are still considerable numbers of queries concerning methyl bromides (MB) and carbontetrachlorides (CTC) due to special permission to trade granted under Essential Use Nomination (EUN). Another notable trend about iPIC in 2010 has been the queries raised concerning sale of ODS to ships (sea going vessels). To promote the mechanism further, several sessions on iPIC were organized on the margins of the 22<sup>nd</sup> Meeting of the Parties of the Montreal Protocol in Bangkok, Thailand, in November 2010.

## CROSS BORDER COOPERATION

### Project Sky Hole Patching II Scores a Big Success

Project Sky Hole Patching II, a global operation aimed at monitoring and controlling the illegal trade in the ODS commenced on 3 May 2010, and concluded on 3 November 2010. Initiated by the WCO (World Customs

Organization) Secretariat and UNEP, Project Sky-Hole-Patching II was coordinated by RILO A/P and supported by other 10 RILOs (Regional Intelligence Liaison Offices), National Ozone Units and UNEP DTIE

(Division of Technology, Industry, and Economics) and its regional offices. There are 80 Customs Administrations from Africa, Asia and the Pacific, Europe and South America participating in the project covering over 270 air, land and sea ports.

The project resulted with fruitful achievements. During the operation period, there are 46 Export Notifications sent by participants. Preliminary statistics shows 28 seizures with 7,500 cylinders weighing more than 108 tons of ODS (Ozone Depleting Substances) and 668 equipments containing ODS were made by 13 Customs Administrations from Europe, Asia and the Pacific and Africa. In one case, two tones of cocaine was seized alongside the ODS.

The project not only effectively monitored the trade in ODS and cracked down on illicit trafficking but also brought the awareness in combating illegal trade in ODS among the participants. Through the project, there is more enhanced practical cooperation among participating parties, as well as national agencies.

Challenge posed by illegal trade in HCFC is estimated to be substantial in coming years. Vigilance and effective enforcement actions are still needed to put an end to the illegal trade.

UNEP has promoted participation, capacity building, coordination between customs and ozone units, and information exchange in the project.

## PATROL Partners Survey Training Needs for Border Enforcement Officers in Vietnam and Thailand

With the approval of PATROL Programme by Thailand Government, a team composed of representatives from UNODC and UNEP went to Chiang Rai Province – the border area between Thailand and Myanmar to conduct TNA for further PATROL implementation on 20 to 21 December 2010.

## Cambodia and Vietnam hold Stakeholders' Meetings to Discuss the Implementation of PATROL



Officials from Police, Customs, Environment and other related authorities gathered in Phnom Penh, Cambodia on 27 to 28 October 2010 to discuss the implementation of PATROL project. A PATROL Project Advisory Committee was established composing of Anti Drug Department, Police, Navy, Border Police, Immigration Police, Customs and Excise, Border Army and other 11 authorities. It was also suggested to draft a sub-decree for implementation of the project. Two new Border Liaison Offices (BLO) will be established in consultation with Vietnam. PATROL trainings will start in the first half of 2011.

The PATROL project was approved by the Vietnam Deputy Prime Minister in June 2010. The stakeholders meeting on PATROL was organized on 13 to 14 December 2010 in Hanoi to discuss the establishment of a steering committee and adoption of the work plan for 2011. The meeting agreed that the National Steering Committee will be composed of Ministry of Public Security, Standing Office on Drugs and Crime— acting as the secretariat, Counter narcotics department, Criminal Police (for human trafficking issues), Environmental Police, Border Army, Customs, Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development and other related agencies. The meeting also agreed to promote government ownership of PATROL project, establish two new BLOs in consultation with Cambodia and pilot training programme in the second half of 2011 in Vietnam.

## Enforcement Agencies and Ozone Units met at Border to Strengthen Control of Transnational Movement of ODS

Following the recommendation of Border Dialogue between Bangladesh, Bhutan, India and Nepal on Monitoring and Controlling Trade in ODS held earlier in

2010, a new round Border Dialogue was held in Pokhara, Nepal on 28 to 29 October 2010.

Fifty participants from National Ozone Unit, the Customs administration of Bangladesh, Bhutan, India and Nepal, and other enforcement agencies such as India Central Bureau of Investigation and Department of Border Management of India attended the meeting. Resource persons from National Academy of Customs, Excise and Narcotics, India, INTERPOL and WCO RILO A/P participated as speakers and trainers.

The two-day programme included one-day training for border enforcement officers and one-day consultation on



concerted action plan for border trade control on ODS between neighboring countries.

The event raised awareness of border enforcement officers on their important role in protecting the ozone layer and preventing illegal trade in ODS. The four participating countries took intensive discussion during the meeting to find way to streamline border enforcement and seek possibilities of mainstreaming environmental issues including the control of ODS in regular bilateral talks and meetings. This workshop came up with some recommendations, including awareness raising and capacity building, border control strengthening, future HCFC trade monitoring, disposal of seized CFCs and bilateral joint operations to be taken, etc.

## UNEP Presents INECE and Asian Network Workshop on Waste Trafficking in Siem Reap



UNEP presented the International Network for Environmental Compliance and Enforcement (INECE) Seaport Environmental Security Network (SESN) 2<sup>nd</sup>

Workshop on Combating the Illegal Trade in Hazardous Wastes through Seaports, in Siem Reap, Cambodia on 29 November 2010 and the Workshop 2010 of the Asian Network for Prevention of Illegal Transboundary Movement of Hazardous Wastes in Cambodia in Siem Reap, Cambodia from 30 November to 2 December 2010. The objective of INECE workshop is to design action-based enforcement cooperation strategies in the Asia region that build capacity of seaport authorities. The Asia Network meeting is to improve enforcement of the Basel Convention in the Asia region. The UNEP representative presented the progress of MEA REN, ARPEC (Asian Partners' Forum on Combating Environmental Crime) and PATROL, and discussed with INECE and Asian Network its future cooperation.

## Side Event on Illegal Trade Organized during the 22<sup>nd</sup> Meeting of Parties to Montreal Protocol (MOP) in Bangkok



A side event of MOP 22 on illegal trade in ODS: Actions to Combat Smuggling and Challenges ahead was organized by UNEP OzonAction on 10 November 2010 in Bangkok, Thailand.

Environmental Investigation Agency assessed the risk of illegal trade in ODS, and appealed to countries to give more attentions to illegal trade in HCFCs, highlighting that smugglers are using the same tricks which they used for CFCs to smuggle HCFCs.

UNEP DTIE presented the East Europe and Central Asia (ECA) Ozone Protection Award to Mr. Alexandros Kiriazis (European Commission) in recognition of his excellent work in combating illegal trade in ozone depleting substances.

RILO A/P introduced "Sky Hole Patching II" and stressed that new trafficking trends have emerged in many countries, and vigilance and effective enforcement actions are still needed to put an end to the illegal trade.

UNEP DTIE introduced the e-learning Module on Montreal Protocol/ODS, which was developed in collaboration with the World Customs Organization in

order to provide updated customs training on the Montreal Protocol. The e-learning module is hosted in the WCO e-learning platform and is now available in English while the French, Spanish, and Russian versions are currently in development. Countries like Malaysia requested the assistance of UNEP in adaptation the module into local languages. UNEP will coordinate this issue with the WCO.

UNEP DTIE has also introduced the implementation of the informal Prior Informed Consent (iPIC) for ODS control, a voluntary mechanism that strengthen the implementation of the national licensing systems for ODS import and export. They encouraged more countries to make more proactive use of the mechanism to increase the effectiveness of their licensing system as well as to reduce the loop hole that may exist still in control of ODS transboundary movements.

A representative from Basel Convention Secretariat attended the event and appealed on the cooperation of UNEP DTIE and WCO in capacity building. United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime also presented the event and briefed the project PATROL (Partnership on Combating Transnational Crime through Regional Organized Law Enforcement).

A training workshop was organized for new ozone officers during the 22<sup>nd</sup> MOP. Participants were invited to visit Thai Customs to gain the expertise on how to detect and identify ODS.

## The 10<sup>th</sup> Asian Partners' Forum on Combating Environmental Crime (ARPEC) held in Bangkok

The 10<sup>th</sup> Meeting of ARPEC convened partners to discuss combating environmental crime at UNEP office in Bangkok, Thailand on 18 to 19 November 2010. Partners updated their activities covering capacity building and enforcement operation during the meeting. UNODC introduced the external evaluation to Border Liaison Office project and the Training Needs Assessment which was conducted in Cambodia in May 2010, Vietnam in August 2010. UNEP presented achievements and lessons learnt from Project Sky Hole Patching II. Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI), Government of India introduced monitoring and control of ODS in India. Interpol updated its operations on wildlife trafficking. Freeland Foundation showed a movie on Operation Lucy which will be aired at the National Geographic channel in 2011. Australian National University introduced a project on Transnational Environmental Crime (TEC) which is funded by Australian Research Council for 2011-2013. The participants discussed how to enhance the cooperation on academic research. The meeting agreed to further promote Green Customs Initiative, online learning systems on ODS, new Harmonized System codes, glossary on term on environmental crime, information exchange and academic research.

# CAPACITY BUILDING

## Vietnam Organizes National Green Customs Workshop

Vietnam's Ministry of Finance and Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment, in cooperation with UNEP, has organized the Vietnam Green Customs workshop in Hanoi on 23-25 August 2010, as a part of regionalization of Green Customs Initiative (GCI) in the Asia and Pacific region. WCO Regional Office for Capacity Building, Interpol, the Basel Convention Regional Center (BCRC) for Southeast Asia has attended the workshop as resource persons.



Mr. Do Hoang Anh Tuan, Vice Minister of Finance, Vietnam, opened the workshop and reconfirmed Vietnam's commitments to international conventions. Seventy two (72) officers from Vietnam Customs, Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment, Ministry of Industry and Trade, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Public Security, Ministry of Defense, and TRAFFIC Vietnam have attended the workshop.



The participants have discussed the challenges faced to control effectively illegal trade of environmentally sensitive commodities, support and assistance needed by customs, how to raise awareness on environmental issues among customs officers, how to improve cooperation with WCO, Interpol and UNEP in addressing environmental crime, information exchange and intelligence collection, handling of seized environmental sensitive commodities, and mandate expansion of Border Liaison Office (BLO) under project PATROL. They recommended the workshop should

## UNEP Participated in the China National Seminar for Customs Officers

Invited by Anti-smuggling Bureau of China Customs, UNEP CAP ROAP, as resource persons, attended the National Seminar for Customs Officers on Combating Drug Smuggling via Cargo Channel and Capacity Building of Green Customs Enforcement held in Xiamen, China on 26 to 29 October 2010. One hundred and thirty officers working in areas of inspection, risk management, intelligence and investigation from 41 Customs districts, Railway Police and Border Control Army participated in the integrated training programme.



The objective of the training was to enhance the enforcement capacity of frontline Customs medium-level officers and investigators in fight against smuggling of drugs, weapons and environmentally sensitive items.

As this is the first contact between UNEP CAP ROAP and GACC in a nation-wide training of such kind, UNEP provided basic training information covering Green Customs Initiative, international trade trends, smuggling methods, concealment methods as well as routes of illegal trade in hazardous wastes, ODS and endangered species of fauna and flora on request of China Customs.

A meeting between UNEP representatives and senior officials from the headquarters of China Customs was also held to discuss future coordination on combating environmental crime.

# NEWS FROM MEA SECRETARIATS

## Twenty second Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol (MOP22) Bangkok, 8 to 12 November 2010



The meeting was attended by over 400 participants representing governments, UN agencies, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, academia, industry and the agricultural sector. MOP22 adopted 16 substantive and several procedural decisions, including on: the terms of reference (TOR) for the Technical and Economic Assessment Panel (TEAP) study on the replenishment of the Multilateral Fund; the TOR for the evaluation of the financial mechanism; assessment of technologies for ozone-depleting substances (ODS) destruction; budget; and data and compliance issues.

Discussions continued on the proposals to amend the Montreal Protocol to include HFCs under its control and the issue of environmentally sound management and destruction of ozone depleting substances particularly those contained in banks. Although little progress was made on those issues at MOP22, discussion are expected to continue along with other key issues for 2011 including, for example, the replenishment of the Multilateral Fund. A brief summary of the outcome of the MOP22 discussions on those key issues are provided below:

**HFC Amendment:** Strong objections by several Article 5 Parties (developing countries) to considering any Hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs): controls under the Montreal Protocol continued to prevail at MOP22. The Parties could only agree to have a discussion in an informal contact group after a general debate in the plenary. Even the draft decisions related to HFC-23 and a request for further assessment by the Technology and Economic Assessment Panel (TEAP) on various aspects of low-GWP alternatives (including HFCs) to HCFCs could not be agreed.

**ODS Banks:** A decision requesting TEAP to develop criteria on use of appropriate ODS destruction technologies was adopted. No far-reaching actions were agreed.

**Terms of Reference (TOR) for the Replenishment Study:** The agreed TOR do not include any estimation of costs related to HFCs or ODS destruction. The TEAP is expected to start on the study this year for consideration by the Open-ended Working Group<sup>1</sup> mid-year, then at the MOP<sup>2</sup>. TEAP has already identified the members to serve on a task force to do the study.

**Terms of Reference for the evaluation of the financial mechanism:** A total budget of up to US\$200,000 has been agreed as the allocation for the evaluation. A qualified external and independent evaluator will be selected by the Ozone Secretariat through a bidding process in the course of early 2011.

**Quarantine and pre-shipment (QPS) uses of methyl bromide:** The draft decision on QPS focusing on collection of information and data on QPS was not agreed. Many felt that a simple decision that focuses more on general process to keep the issue alive until the next meeting of the Parties could have worked. However largely due to time constraints the agreement fell through.

## The 2011 Agenda for the Hazardous Chemicals and Conventions

Hazardous chemicals and wastes issues will be given prominence in 2011 through a series of high level meetings. The fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Stockholm Convention will take place on 25-29 April 2011 in Geneva. The Conference will commemorate the tenth anniversary of the adoption of the Convention by taking stock of its achievements to-date and of the future challenges to overcome. The Conference will offer another occasion to consider listing a new chemical: Endosulfan, a move that would lead to its elimination from the global market. Significant attention will still be paid to the newly listed POPs and to the progress made in implementing the Convention's pertaining obligations.

During its 19<sup>th</sup> session (2-13 May 2011, New York), the Commission on Sustainable Development will focus on the following thematic issues: transport, chemicals, waste management (hazardous and solid), mining, a [10-year framework of programmes](#) on sustainable consumption and production, and aim at developing policy recommendations in these areas. The three Secretariats of the chemicals and wastes conventions will attend and contribute to the meeting, including through a joint UNDESA publication featuring success

stories on enhanced coordination and cooperation among the three conventions, the so-called “synergies process”. The third prominent meeting taking place in 2011 for the chemicals and wastes conventions is the fifth Conference of the Parties to the Rotterdam Convention (20 to 24 June 2011, Geneva). Key issues to be considered will be some chemicals for inclusion in Annex III to the Convention. Strategies will also be sought from the COP for the management of Industrial Chemicals and severely hazardous pesticide formulations.. Finally, the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties will take place in Colombia from 17 to 21 October 2011. Government Ministers are expected to explore ways in which the Basel Convention could help turn wastes into valuable resources, so as to create business and job opportunities, while protecting human health, livelihood, and the environment. The Conference will focus on the theme “minimizing wastes and reusing them”.

Each Conference of the Parties of the chemicals and wastes conventions is also expected to bring forward the synergies process among the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm conventions and to identify processes and means to guide and support Parties towards that end. As part of the effort to raise the awareness about the synergies process and the three Conventions, the UNEP and FAO have launched the Safe Planet Campaign. By sharing responsibility, the Campaign promotes the life-cycle approach to chemicals and waste management, recognizing that effective solutions to the challenges posed by toxic chemicals and wastes require action be taken by a wide variety of agents working at all levels of society, from Government, industry and educational institutions, to community-led initiatives, grassroots organizations, and the decisions of individual households and consumers.

## Engaging Prosecutors: Recent Developments in the Basel Convention

During its seventh session (10-14 May 2010, Geneva), the Open-ended working group of the Basel Convention decided to convene, by electronic means, a small group of experts to develop an instruction manual on the prosecution of illegal traffic. Experts from the Asian region include nominees from China, Maldives, Pakistan and the Philippines. The group will work on the basis of an outline prepared by the Secretariat contained in the annex to document UNEP/CHW/OEWG/6/12 (<http://www.basel.int/meetings/oewg/oewg6/docs/12e.doc>) and is to report on the outcome of its work to the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (17-21 October 2011, Colombia). This initiative is part of a growing recognition among the international community that in order to successfully prevent and combat illegal traffic, it is necessary to engage with a broader group of the stakeholders involved, at one point or another, in the MEA enforcement chain.

## INTERPOL

INTERPOL marked the inception of *Building a Sustainable INTERPOL Environmental Crime Programme*. Worldwide Chiefs of Police adopted a Resolution at the annual International Criminal Police Organization's (INTERPOL) General Assembly, in Qatar, on 8<sup>th</sup> of November 2010. The Resolution calls upon national law enforcement authorities to recognize that environmental crime is not restricted by borders and involves organized crime networks which engage in other crime types including murder, corruption, fraud and theft. It notes that there is a vital need for a global response and that INTERPOL should play a leading role in supporting national and international enforcement. In addition, worldwide Police Leaders emphasized the need for responsible national agencies, police, customs or environmental agencies to be connected with INTERPOL and their National Central Bureaus and urged them to support INTERPOL by making voluntary financial contributions or by seconding specialized personnel in support of the Environmental Crime Programme's mission. This encouragement for support was further extended to the international governmental and non-governmental community.
